Mission

The mission of the Eureka Conservation District is to coordinate technical and educational resources to meet the needs of the individuals within the District for the conservation of natural resources.

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Introduction

The Eureka Conservation District (ECD) was founded in 1950 which covered a land mass of 1,650 square miles. After land owner petitions and land transfers from Jiggs and the Humboldt Conservation District, the ECD now covers 4,175 square miles, the entirety of Eureka County.

The principal goal of the ECD is to conserve natural resources – soil, water and related resources – for current and future wise-use and enjoyment. Conservation assistance is made available free of charge, to district landowners and operators through coordination of working agreements and pursuit of partnerships and project funding with the USDA-NRCS and other federal agencies, state agencies, local agencies such as the Eureka County Natural Resources Department, and many private entities such as the mining industry and wildlife groups.

➤ Meetings Held:

The ECD met seven times from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021. Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Landowner Appreciation Dinner was not held this year. The ECD supervisors, individually, attended numerous meetings and workshops throughout the year.

➤ Outcomes:

The ECD concentrated on conservation efforts in critical resource problem areas and important land use areas. The ECD provided conservation assistance to district cooperators, individuals, producers, and government agencies. The ECD reinforced working relationships with various agencies and support programs having a common conservation interest. The ECD continued providing information, educational programs, and carried out district administrative activities.

Projects and Services

The ECD concentrates its efforts in resource problem areas and conducts education and on-the-ground projects to conserve water, soil, and other related resources. By hosting various projects, they are helping reinforce working relationships with district cooperators, individuals, minorities, limited resource farmers, and Eureka County. ECD provides multiple services in order to help conserve the county's natural resources.

Youth Education

The ECD continues their educational outreach and efforts by working with the Eureka County School District, Eureka County Juvenile Probation Office, Nevada Youth Range Camp, and by offering College and High School scholarships. The ECD helps promote educating students on protecting soil, water and related resources from unwise use.

➤ **National Association of Conservation Districts Poster Contest:**

The ECD provided poster contest materials to the Eureka Elementary School, Crescent Valley Elementary School and to the Pine Valley students. The theme was "Where Would We Bee Without Pollinators?" which was provided by the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD). The ECD provided materials and the students were educated on what the theme meant in order to help them depict/draw the theme on their poster. Once all posters were submitted, they were judged by the ECD and the top three posters in each category were awarded cash prizes and certificates. The winning posters from the local competition were forwarded onto the Nevada Association of Conservation Districts (NvACD) state poster contest.

➤ Eureka County Juvenile Probation Office Duck Stamp Contest:

On-the-Ground Projects

- **Diamond Valley Groundwater Management Plan (DVGMP):**

The ECD continues to budget for and makes itself available to participating in and facilitate the DVGMP in order to better understand alternatives for the water issues being faced in Diamond Valley (DV). DV is over pumped resulting in a water table decline and unsustainable use. Two-thirds of the population of Eureka County derives their water from DV and DV hosts roughly 200 center-pivots and contributes millions of dollars to the local economy. The ECD strives to participate in public meetings that may impact the district. The ECD has been providing facilitation, administrative assistance, and sponsoring lunch at the DVGMP workshops. The DVGMP is now completed and approved by the State Engineer but has been overturned by the District Court and appealed to the Nevada Supreme Court. ECD anticipates continuing, where appropriate, to assist on conservation-related matters under the DVGMP and potential development of a revised, or new, GMP and helping Diamond Valley water rights holders find solutions.

- **ECD Rangeland Drills:**

The ECD owns three rangeland drills that continue to be leased and used by local landowners. By cooperating with individuals, groups and local officials in having the rangeland drills available, the county is advancing in conservation goals and objectives. The use of the drills by local landowners has proven beneficial for post-fire rehabilitations, pasture restorations, and noxious weed control. Having this service available not only benefits the local landowner but helps improve long term conservation planning. The drills were rented out a handful of times over this past year.

- **Weed Control:**

The Eureka County Board of Commissioners, through the authority granted in SB 276, designated the ECD Board of Supervisors to become the Weed Control District Board of Directors in January 2016. While the budgeting for the Weed District falls under the Board of Commissioners, ECD has directed the work completed under the Weed District and continued partnerships with landowners to control noxious weeds. Many thousands of dollars and hundreds of hours were devoted to weed control since ECD took the helm over the Weed District; mostly through contract spraying, herbicide distribution to landowners, and provided technical assistance. In 2020, additional funding was secured by the Weed District under the multi-year agreements with Battle Mountain and Elko BLM.

➤ Pinion-Juniper (PJ) Removal:

Over the last few years, the ECD participated financially and administratively in a continued effort to cut PJ trees down on privately owned lands in important wildlife habitats. The project focuses on improving wildlife habitat, primarily for Greater Sage Grouse, increasing water availability, and providing additional forage for livestock operations. The ECD was successful in receiving an additional \$29,740.10 in funding through the Conservation District Program Sage Grouse Habitat Grant prior to the end of the fiscal year ending in June 2020 and the work was completed in this year in November 2020. ECD contracted out to Quicksilver Contracting to remove small PJ trees from prioritized previous treatment areas as maintenance. Between November 16 and November 23, 2020, a total of 2190 acres were maintained.

➤ Seasonal Intern Related to PJ Projects:

Over the last few years, the ECD participated financially and administratively in a continued effort to cut PJ trees down on privately owned lands in important wildlife habitats. The project focuses on improving wildlife habitat, primarily for Greater Sage Grouse, increasing water availability, and providing additional forage for livestock operations. ECD was able to bring on a seasonal intern, Keller Hyde, who started in June and primarily worked through the remainder of the fiscal year (and through the entire 2020 summer) to revisit PJ treatment areas and take repeat photos to compare the sites pre-treatment and post-treatment. Mr. Hyde also documented other resource issues while in the field including wild horse use and weed infestations.

➤ Seasonal Intern, General:

The seasonal intern also assisted ECD by volunteering to set up Youth Range Camp, herbicide distribution to Weed District landowners, locating stock well locations for a landowner using GPS, and attending various stakeholder meetings.

➤ PJ Compost and Biochar:

The ECD has been involved and continued in this project to find a use for the PJ biomass removed for the above habitat projects. There is also a focus on the potential of locally sourced PJ biochar and PJ compost being used as soil amendments to increase soil moisture holding capacity in Diamond Valley and for local mining reclamation and yards with lead-contaminated soil being removed and replaced in order to reduce irrigation needs and increase vegetation establishment. This year, PJ biochar compost and biochar previous created and on hand were donated to the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) for their use at various Wildlife Management Areas to use in restoration plots. Brittany Trimble, NDOW Habitat (Seed & Soil) Biologist is the NDOW lead. ECD hosted tours of PJ treatment areas and compost/biochar application areas for NDOW. NDOW has

completed the application of the compost and biochar and will keep ECD involved in the results moving forward.

There is still continued interest to continue to produce additional compost utilizing local PJ chips and to continue to apply and test in various applications.

- **Crescent Valley Rangeland Improvement Project – Feral Horse Gather:**
The ECD and Eureka County have been working with BLM and private land owners in Crescent Valley over the last few years to improve rangeland conditions. Much of the work has been related to noxious weed control. One of the primary issues impeding rangeland health and improvement is the huge population of feral horses in the area. These horses are tribal owned horses in trespass. They are not horses that fall under the “wild” status under federal law. Eureka County and the ECD were able to build the partnership with the tribal interests that own the horses to gather the horses. A private donation from a third-party interest was used to assist in the costs in gathering and removing the horses. Rangeland conditions have had a marked improvement in the area based on this gather.

Community Outreach

The ECD reaches out to the community by providing educational material, publications, projects, services, other workshops, and typically hosts an annual Landowner Appreciation Dinner and elections on election years. Due to COVID considerations, the Dinner was not held this year. Providing community outreach helps the community know that the ECD has resources available to benefit them as landowners and Eureka County. By working with the community, the ECD has advanced their conservation goals and objectives for the present day and the future.

- **Resource Needs Assessment:**
The ECD committed to be one of the seven Conservation Districts in NV to complete a resource needs assessment. The Resource Needs Assessment was created to identify the resource concerns in the area. By determining those concerns, they are able to create plans for the resource needs in the area and also use that information to apply for funding. All of this will help develop a follow up conservation action plan with an updated set of issues, potential solutions, and projects. This will also help with funding opportunities and with leverage when collaborating with federal agencies. The process has open for community involvement and allowed them to express their resource concerns and ideas as well. There were a handful of discussions held by ECD throughout year to move forward with a Conservation Action Plan (CAP) to address the RNA resource needs identified.

➤ Irrigator’s Workshop

ECD sponsored an Irrigator Workshop on May 11, 2021 with Supervisor Denise Moyle taking the lead. There were great presentations and discussion and lunch was generously sponsored by Mt. Wheeler Power. The workshop was offered in a hybrid format with some attendees and speakers both in-person and virtual through video conferencing. The speakers and topics included:

- Dan Putnam, forage specialist from University of California, Davis, presented on alfalfa production strategies under drought and water shortage.
- Matthew Bromley and Thomas Ott with Desert Research Institute introduced OpenET, an online platform to use evapotranspiration for water use management.
- Kevin Robison from Mt. Wheeler Power discussed the future of Mt. Wheeler Power and offered solutions for power conservation.
- Adam Sullivan, Acting State Engineer, and Bryce Vorwaller and Jared McCrum from Nevada Division of Water Resources shared water use data and gave an update on Diamond Valley-specific water use and management and the status and future of the Diamond Valley Groundwater Management Plan.
- Jaime Jasmine from NRCS and Clair Kehoe from FSA provided information on NRCS programs that are open and available FSA programs of aid and assistance.

➤ 2020 Election:

The ECD also held a mass meeting election November 9, 2020. A Public Notice of the election was posted throughout the community and places in the Eureka Sentinel newspaper. The Eureka County Clerk conducted the elections for the replacement of two ECD supervisors whose terms were about to expire. Ms. Buchanan and Mr. McCuin were both re-elected. Certification of the election was timely filed with the Conservation District Program.

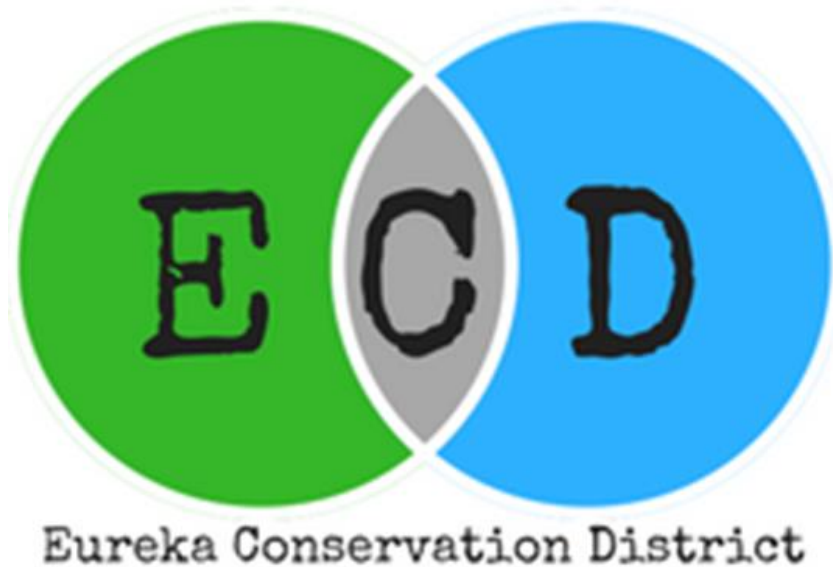
