- Briefly describe your Conservation Districts mission:
 - The Carson Valley Conservation District works to achieve a stable, healthy river system that provides for abundant agricultural production, wildlife habitat, stable riverbanks, and high-water quality conditions. The Carson Valley Conservation District works to achieve cooperative relations where the private landowners, county, state, and federal agencies maintain their lands and work cooperatively, and openly, to solve natural resource problems. Furthermore, this district assists local agricultural producers with the protection of their surface water conveyance systems.
- Describe the Conservation Districts major achievements for the FY.
 - The Carson Valley Conservation District accomplishes many projects throughout the year for the betterment of the overall ecological health of the land within our district boundaries. This district completed several projects along the Carson River that have been identified as requiring stream bank stabilization, restoration, and maintenance. The district was able to treat 2,550 linear feet of failing stream banks. The CVCD also worked to restore over 400 acres within the Carson River corridor; restorations encourage the beneficial use of severely degraded lands including the River Corridor, floodplains, and riparian zones. The district worked closely with NDOT through our trial program to help make drainage repairs and maintain existing infrastructure on private property. This program has helped the State of Nevada mitigate damage to adjacent landowners due to stormwater erosion from their right-away. The CVCD continues to develop a cooperative partnership with Douglas County for weed management and stormwater issues. The weed control program involves the identification, mapping, and prioritization of specific noxious weeds to control and implement a treatment strategy. The Carson Valley Conservation District treated approximately 350 acres via backpack spraying alongside Douglas County. The CVCD has entered into a formal agreement with the NRCS Minden Office to aid in administering the EQIP program and/or doing projects that will enhance water quality or wildlife habitat and benefit agricultural producers. This agreement puts a particular emphasis on the Bi-State population of the Greater Sage Grouse.

 - o The district was able to accomplish all of its goals this fiscal year.
- What goals did the CD struggle to accomplish and why?
 - O The Carson Valley Conservation District was able to meet all of its goals for this fiscal year but there were some roadblocks along the way. COVID has made many commonplace activities very difficult. The district was unable to complete our annual work with River Wranglers this year due to COVID. Furthermore, the permitting process and overarching red-tape created by the government's environmental divisions hinders the district's ability to complete all desired projects along the Carson River.

Outreach and Education:

• What outreach methods did the Conservation District use in the fiscal year?

O The district continued to update its CVCD website during this fiscal year. We expanded our email list of new agricultural producers in Carson Valley. We participated in a regenerative agricultural presentation and are currently planning a test plot at the Wild Harmony Ranch. We held an annual award dinner where we cost-hosted the event with the local FFA club. During this event we awarded the producer of the year award posthumously to Mr. John Asquaga. The district also provides those present with information about our conservation district and how we help with natural resource issues throughout our boundary. We have expanded our equipment rental program by handing out our informational flier at different meetings.

• Were the outreach methods successful? Why or Why not?

Our methods were fairly successful however it seems as if we are still dealing with uncertainties involving the pandemic. We have not held any Carson River Workday events with local high schools and River Wranglers because of the pandemic; however we anticipate having our first one in the Fall of 2022.

What education opportunities did the Conservation District participate in?

We held our annual update for the Douglas County Future Leaders highlighting the district's work throughout Douglas County. Staff has presented at local Carson River Coalition meetings as the annual Floodplain Management Conference.

• What is needed for the Conservation District to provide more outreach and education?

Staffing and funding are the biggest needs that the Carson Valley Conservation District could use to provide additional education and outreach support throughout the community.

Natural Resources:

• What natural resource concerns did the Conservation District address?

The biggest resource concerns that were addressed this year are soil erosion, water quality, habitat enhancement, floodplain rehabilitation and invasive weed treatments.

• What natural resources concerns were brought forward but not addressed? And why were they not addressed by the Conservation District?

The district continues to have impacts on local producers who rely on the Carson River for their adjudicated water rights. This water is used for crop production and livestock watering. These waters have been impacted by drought and lack of necessary funding to repair and maintain the Carson River Corridor. Increased requirements from regulatory agencies have also limited our ability to address some of these resource concerns. Several landowners have expressed concerns with the management of the Carson River.

What natural resource concerns does the Conservation District need addressing or need more information on?

 Due to the difficulty in obtaining permits for river work, we would need more assistance in funding and permit writing to better achieve our goals. Additional lobbying for Conservation District funding and staff support.

• What natural resource concerns did the Conservation Districts Local Work Group with NRCS identify as the top priority?

The Carson Valley Conservation District held the annual LWG meeting in conjunction with the Minden NRCS office in August of 2022. The top priority issues that were identified were (1) Noxious and Invasive Weeds, (2) Fuels Treatment and Fire Rehabilitation, and (3) Water (a) water quality (b) water quantity, and (c) drought.

What technical assistance did the Conservation District or staff provide for NRCS?

o The CVCD helped NRCS with several permit applications for local producers who are participating in EQIP, AMA, and CSP programs. In addition, we also worked with NRCS to no-till drill seed over 400 acres in an effort to improve crop production and floodplain management. Local landowners often reached out to us for advice on treating noxious weeds and reseeding production fields.

Projects:

- List any projects and give a brief description of the project and the Conservation Districts' role.
 - Three stream bank projects were completed this year. Construction commenced on October 1st, 2021, and was completed by March 25th, 2022. The projects treated a total of 2,250 linear feet of stream bank and reduced the sediment load by 575.5 cubic yards. The district has identified multiple locations that have been restored in the past that require additional maintenance to ensure that they are functioning correctly. The district solicited several bids for a contractor/operator, an excavator with an operator and a chainsaw with an operator to complete work within the project areas. Coons Construction completed the bank shaping alongside the CVCD bioengineering crew and Douglas County. The district's staff works as the project manager overseeing all construction and bioengineering practices on the Carson River.



- What new grant/s were awarded to the CD? Describe the grant work and goals, the amount awarded and any partners on the grant.
 - o Carson Water Subconservancy District
 - CWSD funds are used throughout the Carson Valley Conservation District's annual work. Funds
 are allocated for channel clearing, snagging, and maintenance. As well as cooperative noxious
 weed management, river restoration, CVCD operations, and staffing.
 - \$175,000.00
 - Nevada Division of Water Resources
 - NDWR funding is allocated for river restoration work and implemented through on-site construction, bioengineering, and staffing.
 - \$250,000.00
 - Nevada Division of Environmental Protection
 - NDEP 319(h) funds are used for river restoration resulting in improved water quality and implemented through on-site restoration practices.
 - \$150,000.00
 - O Douglas County Stormwater & Noxious Weeds
 - Douglas County funds are used for noxious and invasive weed management, treatment, and mapping, as well as river restoration and administration. These funds are implemented throughout the year in order to reach CVCD goals.
 - \$125,000.00

 - Nevada Department of Transportation
 - NDOT funds are used for right-of-way erosion mitigation that impacts private landowners. This
 program is run by district staff who manages the projects, crews, payroll, materials, equipment,
 permits, and fees.

 - NDOW funds are used for reseeding and bioengineering supplies used and implemented along the Carson River.
 - \$10,000.00
- What grant/s were closed out this fiscal year? Describe the grant work and goals accomplished. What was the final amount of grant money spent and the amount matched by the CD?
 - All of our grants were closed out this fiscal year and we achieved our goals of treating invasive weeds, stabilizing four river bank projects, reseeding over 400 acres within the 100-year floodplain. The grand total of all the grants is \$\$934,056.69. The Carson Valley Conservation District matched \$303,310.00.
- What grant/s are ongoing, and describe the work done this year? What is the current amount spent under the grant and the amount of match provided by the CD?
 - o All of the CVCD grants have been closed.
- What overall grant needs were identified by the Conservation District?
 - We continue to look at expanding our natural resource grants to better serve our landowners and project partners. We have looked into using the Nevada Dream Tag fund program to remove pinion and juniper trees out of the Greater Nevada Sage Grouse areas. We are looking into conservation innovation grants in hopes of providing alternatives to farm and ranch techniques such as regenerative agriculture.

 - In the future, the Carson Valley Conservation District looks forward to working with any/ all funding sources and individual parties who are ecological stakeholders within our operational boundaries.
